

**TARINGA'S** points tally of 15, made up of 7 wins and a draw, remains intact, following their narrow defeat of GOLD COAST UNITED by 2 - 1 last Sunday.

This gives them a clear one point over Redlands, who were there at the game no doubt to give Gold Coast some friendly encouragement.

In a game like this, where the strong wind played havoc with the high ball, both defences were called on to perform miracles.

Defence tight Taringa, attacked with the edge for the first 20 minutes, but the forwards could only perform 'moon' shots — like way out, man.

Half an hour went by before Coast's Dave Earwicker, playing on the left wing, put over a cross that was immediately despatched by Archie Shaw for the opening goal of the day.

Seven minutes later Nils Larsen picked up a short corner, ran it to the back line and then put over an 'impossible' cross, which Charlie Stephan put away to bring Taringa level, 1-1.

Following the half time break, it was fully expected that Taringa, with strong wind advantage, would run up a large goal credit.

This was not to be and 25 minutes had ticked by before Eric Steen found the ball at his feet, following a goal-mouth melee and pushed it in with keeper Herman Schechtel going the other way.

A one goal lead now for Taringa only meant that Taringa's defence department were going to be pressed to the hilt, because the Coast lads don't give in easy.

Blues' keeper Jimmy Dinsdale, backs Brian Ellingham, Nils Larsen and Vic Robinson were in big trouble several times when the Coast forwards, several times all but scored.

With minutes to go, Taringa reversed the play to attack and with big Frank in the centre and Charlie Stephan and Trevor Davis either side, all sorts of fancy foot and headwork went on but no further score was to come out of it.

Gold Coast backs defended ruggedly, with Alan Wilkins, Alec Bocsa and Billy Watson playing their part and no doubt hoping against hope for at least a draw.

### FORREST DOWN BARDON

Everyone knows that an unproductive forward line has been Germania's downfall, but last week they more than doubled their 'goals for' tally in lifting it from two to five. This was of course against quite a strong Oxley United set of defenders.

Admittedly they were a bit lucky in being presented with an early bonus in the form of Les Jones' own goal. But Buchanan and Ziggy Wehner (who was the team's attacking mainstay in 2nd division), have apparently developed good understanding with winger Roy Kaithness, promoted from Reserve Grade.

Azzurri fail to take full advantage of centre forward David Keen's capabilities, and Ian Johnstone (although chiming in with a typical Johnston goal last week), will soon have to begin playing like an Australian squad member.




