

"RETALIATION"

What is wrong with the retaliation rule? Since its inception as an edict through F.I.F.A. it has been an extremely contentious subject.

Is too much emphasis being placed on the literal word and not enough on its actual meaning? Are the powers that be from the Federation Executive down through the referee to clubmen and players abusing the true sense through an attitude of least line of resistance? In short, are they prepared to accept retaliation as the cardinal foul?

What does retaliation mean? To give in return. The fact of use of the word at all means a reaction to a misdemeanour. This in turn gives thought to reason that the initial foul could be premeditated. The referee has the valid excuse that any prior action to the retaliatory movement happened behind his back and his action can only be on what he has visibly detected.

What of linesmen? So often they could pass for one of the three wise monkeys when there is a moment of truth. This too could be because they have been overschooled on the penal assessment of the word. The cold facts are, they have been issued a directive and detailed to endorse it. In fairness to these men, even with a perfect score, they cannot expect more than 50 per cent in accordance with their rulings. However because of this should the honest player be the victim?

In ordinary common law retaliation is invariably the lesser of two evils. Yet, whereby it should be a fundamental law in sportsmanship that the game be kept clean, it is often the clean player, in a subconscious reaction against an opponent of less scrupulous character deliberately fouling him, who suffers the humility of being penalised.

The offender through snide tactics lives to fight (and kick) another day. This appears to be the blatant weakness in this directive.

Whilst in principle one cannot condone retaliation, on the serious side it can be understood as an inborn human trait. Though not so in any manner or form, frivolous abuse of it. Less still can one understand the covetous element deliberately creating it.

If the situation were to be sincerely analysed and any attempt whatsoever made to rectify it the answer must surely lie in the apprehension of the creator and not the desecration of the pawn.

Bardon Bridges "Generation" Gap

Both teams showed sprinklings of the two generations last Saturday in their line-up — but Bardon's younger section showed just a little more polish when it got near the goalmouth.

GAP'S "oldies", included Johnny Martin in goals, Harry Brook as an experienced and knowing half back and last but by no means least, coach George Pagan directing both defence and attack at inside left.

Strategically placed in BARDON'S side, where experience tells, were Gerry Nahuysen, who mainstayed the half back line with intelligent football and up in the front line were coach Gordon Arrowsmith and newcomer (to Bardon anyway) John Darlington.

So the "local" battle began — but the Gap chaps, favourites to win, were a little shocked six minutes from the start, when John Darlington drew first blood with a high net shot, made possible by a well set up pass from young Paul Harper.

Twenty minutes later, youth paid off for Gap, when John Hammond, in combination with Hans Lesquillier, popped one over "Chops" Heath's head, to draw level with the half time 1-1 score.

Most of the second half comprised scrappy "bunchy" play until Gordon Arrowsmith gave Bardon the lead with six minutes to go.

Paul Harper again sent in a pass from the backline which Arrowsmith latched on to and his shot gave keeper Johnny Martin only a touch as it went into the net.

Three minutes later Bardon's Keith Miller, on the left wing, grabbed an opportunity and with a neat pass to John Darlington which in turn was passed on to Harper, who in turn passed it into the net for 3-1.

Shot of the day came 30 seconds from the end, when Gap were pressing particularly hard.

Coach George Pagan, standing loose outside the penalty box, sent in a "bullet" shot that hit the bottom of the goalpost — had it hit halfway up the post there is no doubt a new post would have been required. I mention this shot mainly because Bardon's keeper 'Chops' Heath never saw it.

UNI. - REDLANDS SHOCK DRAW

UNI. shocked everyone, including themselves, when they held REDLANDS to a nil-all draw last Saturday.

REDCLIFFE DIDN'T DO IT

With the tipster predicting a REDCLIFFE 2-pointer against TARINGA, the Red's tackled their task of toppling the league leaders with great confidence.

Weather conditions were perfect for the 90-minute thriller to follow.

Taringa won the toss and with the wind advantage, played the better football for the first 15 minutes — but Redcliffe started to settle down to the game they are capable of and the next quarter hour saw Blues keeper Jimmy Dinsdale complete 10 goal kicks to keeper Alan Goff's one.

This style of play often found both forward lines just one man short to break each other's defence.

Redcliffe were unlucky after several goal raids, with Brian Sheldrick latching onto a perfect square ball and from 30 yards to send in a dream of a shot, only to see it rebound from under the cross-bar.

(Following this, I believe Redcliffe are going to instal 'round' cross-bars.)

This shot seemed to rattle Taringa a little, with Redcliffe sharing a good 70 per cent of the game — but Lady Luck apparently was attending another game — because the Blues defence held good for 0-0 at lemons.

The second half saw both teams approach the next 45 with great caution, with both sets of forwards making several breaks — however the defence departments were having a field day.

Whereas at the other end keeper Jimmy and his defence bracket of brother Clive Dinsdale, Brian Ellingham and Peter Keeble were really earning their crust, holding out not one, but umpteenth scoring chances — which were kicked off the line — punched over the bar and shaving the uprights.

Shooting everywhere but in the net, EASTS went down to the improved FORREST side 4-1.




SOUTH COAST AT TOOWOOMBA

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


