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HOLLANDIA-INALA CLUB HISTORY

The club was founded on 24th June, 1957, and was named Soccer Club Hollandia. During 1957 the team did not play any premierships fixtures, but a number of friendly matches were played, all but one were either drawn or won. As for a field to play on we were given the Darra Recreation ground, also used by a club called Inala, and a very vigorous training programme was conducted.

1958 was the first year the club actively participated in the competition. Two teams were fielded both coming out in the fifth division. The first team had a very good year with only seven loss points and finishing in third place on the premierships table. However, the Association decided to promote us all the same, because they considered the first team too strong for the 5th division. The 2nd team also improved, noticeably winning its last three premierships matches.

Our first team comprised the following players:—

H. Ploeg, M. Strik, L. de Valk, J. Bont, R. Bazuin, A. Mosterd, captain, C. v. d. Meer, J. Ploeg, B. Neger and an unknown player I have not yet found the name of. The trainer was Mr. Wade. Final results for 1958:

It might be of interest to know that

in those days Redank counted among its committee Messrs. Wilkins and Mortimer. No introduction necessary I would imagine.

During 1959 the team set the trend for the years to come. We experienced the first premierships 4th Division. We also fielded three teams. The 2nd team finished fifth in the 5th division and unfortunately our third team finished last, but it numbered a fair few very young and promising players.

Top goal scorers this season were M. Strik 22, Jaap van Dam 11 and one of our old greats Leo Alcmán 9. The supporters also grew in numbers and activity and on 22.7.59 saw the birth of our supporters club. Unfortunately no longer in existence but something which might well be worth re-establishing. The 2nd team also won the Centenary Cup, defeating Thornside who had a player named J. Wytenberg 1-0 in the final.

The 1959 Premierships team comprised among others; M. Strik, C. v. d. Stam, who is the current record holder of

playing time in Hollandia, G. Hoonhout, rubber legs was our dazzling centre-half for many years, J. v. Dam now a very successful speedway driver, B. Neger, L. Aleman, H. Roosen, A. Mosterd, (capt.) H. Mollee, now our team manager, P. Hoek and J. v. Dam snr. Reserves were K. Hoekstra, C. v. d. Meer, R. Sigtenhorst and C. Zandvliet. During 1960 and 1961 we had to bide our time in the 3rd division but we won the Association 3rd division in 1962 and with the Feration breakaway we were promoted direct to the 1st division. In 1963 we became 1st division premiers and also won the Tristram Shield.

It also saw radical changes with the influx of English players in the team and a new interest in Junior football. With the vast untapped soccer area of Inala at their feet Hollandia were quickly able to find four teams. With the tremendous effort of the recent Junior Committees this number in recent years has grown to about 20 and will see even more in the next couple of years, I am sure.

During 1963 the 2nd and 3rd team also won their respective premierships. In 1964 the then sitting committee realized that to progress in the game they should join the present Queensland Soccer Federation. Quite a number of other clubs made this decision and a play-off was held to determine who would go to the 1st division and who to the 2nd division. Unfortunately for us Redbank ably assisted by such players as the Wilkins brothers and Dale Mortimer managed to defeat us by 1-0 in an exciting game resulting in us having to be satisfied with 2nd division.


In 1964 saw even bigger changes in Hollandia. The legendary Rags Tatters joined Hollandia and also some very promising players were bought like the Wilkins brothers and Dale Mortimer. Building up this new and young team meant a hard and long road, but the boys upset all calculations and won the 2nd division premierships and championship and moved to the 1st division.

However 1965 saw the first setback in the club's history. Lack of experience made it impossible for our boys to keep their ground and unfortunately we were relegated back to 2nd division. However the potential of the team was quite apparent and during the season we gained a lot of experience and respect from the soccer fraternity.

In 1966 we took the road back, winning the premierships, with well over a

Redcliffe Thrash Redlands

Redlands were unlucky to find Alan Goff (not off) but on top form, as he made a fantastic save to stop a penalty from the boot of the 'Menace'.

Wiping their brows for a moment, Redcliffe were off again, with Brian Manley putting over a cross, which was partially saved by keeper Dick Karreman, however Ernie Grazier too control of the loose ball and slammed in the 'goodnight Dick' shot that was to be the 4th and final goal of a very exciting match.

Even with four against him, Dick was undoubtedly the best of Redlands bunch on the day — but knowing these blokes, this is just the sting that will spur them on — I'd sure hate to be playing them this week-end.


For South Coast centre half Greg Wright and left back Ian Mitchell worked tirelessly.


This should be the match of the week-end, as although Merton are in what appears to be a lowly seventh position in the ladder, they are a mere four points behind the leaders.


Murtagh should make the game interesting for Ed Hillier and company.

**Germania v.
Polonia**

Germania's shock 3-1 win over Grange Thistle last Saturday was the result of a determined display based on fine teamwork, according to reliable observers.

When you remember that Thistle coasted to a 4-0 victory over Germania only a week earlier, the win must give Germania a boost for their meeting with Polonia at Bulimba on Saturday.

Bob Buchanan and Ziggy Wehner showed out in midfield for Germania, who still played soundly, when Mike Melburg came in as left winger when half back Ralph Clark had to retire injured.

Stan Sander seems certain to be out again through his elbow injury and his goalkeeping replacement, Laurie Noyes, will have gained in confidence following the win against Thistle.

However, Polonia will be a tough hurdle for Germania on Saturday.

The Polonia defence of goalkeeper Frank Romanowski, Ed Musial, George Whittaker and Derek Attwood, supplemented by Derek Robson in an attacking-defensive role, is a really dominant force, capable of taming any attack in the competition.

But, like Germania, the Polonia attack is erratic when in goalscoring range. Last match, against Azzurri, the clever Polonia approach work, in which Owen Monaghan and Syd Tucker were prominent, often was wasted, but it is only fair to state that the Azzurri defence was a compact deadly tacking force, which harried Polonia into hurried shooting.

The match is vital to Germania and Polonia.

Germania now have moved two points ahead of Coalstars who now are last, while Polonia have improved to second place, but are on equal points with Hellenic and Thistle, and ahead of them only on goal average.

Polonia's main scorers have been Roger Clark and Syd Tucker, and despite Tucker's consistent midfield display against Azzurri last Sunday, Polonia may have to consider moving Tucker back into the forwards to bolster the attack.

I predict Polonia will be too strong for Germania, principally on the grounds of experience and a stable defence, but I also predict a low-scoring match.

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
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FOURTH DIVISION
