## LINESMAN'S VIEW

A WEEK past Tuesday the most important gathering in soccer was held at Perry Park when the presidents of all clubs were invited to gather in order that the future of the code be discussed. The meeting was a disaster, no other word could describe the outcome, such was the lethargy and lack of contribution shown by the people involved.

As most readers of this magazine will know, for sometime now concern has been shown by certain people as to where the code was going at all levels. This meeting should have been the launching pad for ideas, or even a master plan, whereby every club in the Queensland Soccer Federation could become involved in making this game the most progressive in the State.

Instead, it turned into another forum for every minor club and club official to air his views in what was wrong at his particular club level, the usual hotch-potch of complaints, experiences and good old fashioned whinges, all concerning their own small part in the overall scheme of things.

There is no doubt that in the Brisbane area we have more prospective Philips League clubs than anywhere in Australia. Almost every club official at a lower level loves to give the impression that they are only one or two seasons away from challenging Brisbane City or Lions for their national league spot. Now that a State League is being talked about the "disease" has become worse, for you can practically see the T.A.A. signs flashing in everyone's eyes at the mention of its name.

Who do these people think they are kidding, what sort of image do they have of themselves and their clubs, can't they see the forest for the trees, for, if

ever Brisbane soccer needs a good shake up it is now, and if it is not forthcoming soon there is no doubt that the Queensland Soccer Federation will be facing an almighty crisis in the near future probably the biggest since Federation fifteen years ago. That was the purpose of the meeting. Soccer in this State is at a crossroads. Strong measures are needed if anything is to be saved from the wreckage that exists below the standard of Philips League. To hear Clubs from fourth and fifth division ask how they can get into State League is absolutely ludicrous at this stage.

These clubs, many of whom have battled gamely to achieve their present status appear to feel that the unlimited exuberance they have undoubtedly shown, is enough to take them to the highest echelons of the game. They give no thought whatever to the fact that their present "set-ups" are based on a mostly amateur, fun loving philosophy with seniors and juniors all "mucking in" to make a success of the local team in a new suburb. Little do they realise the shattering impacts before them when they begin to deal with coaches and players who consider themselves good enough to be paid.

Little do they realise the feelings of "junior parents", who are members of the committee, when suddenly \$10,000 of their hard-earned income is spent on a team that can barely draw a 'gate' of 200 people on any normal weekend. With a yearly income from that team of say \$4,000, i.e. gate money, raffles, doubles and canteen they are literally being asked to vote \$6,000 down the drain. This they just won't do. Players, in their present team, loyal, true, fun loving amateurs will become hard and grasping, giving total effort if everything is to their liking, moving on if not.

This is the lot of the present first division team and it was very obvious listening to these self same clubs last Tuesday that they have little or no experience of soccer at this level.

Clubs are sending representatives along to these meetings who contribute nothing or use the occasion to get in a plug for their club. They appear to have little or no foresight beyond the lintels of their Club room doors and in doing so they are holding the game of soccer in complete and utter contempt.

There are a few devoted people in the game in Brisbane and to watch their faces as the meeting unfolded was to watch the faces of despair. One of them, Terry Brown of St. Helens, attacked the meeting twice with the challenge to look to neighbouring clubs with a view to uniting and in the unison gaining the strength and following that would enable them to compete at a higher level. For all the good he did he could have been addressing a ladies meeting in the local church hall at Ebbw Vale.

Ray Despot, Redlands president suggested that clubs, his included, were lacking in professional management. Most people looked around accusingly at someone else! Unfortunately that was the tone of the meeting, no interest unless it involved our club directly. The reader may well wonder why it is that in two and a half hours discussion the presidents of all clubs and the management committee cannot come up with something constructive. He does not wonder alone.

At the end of 2½ hours the President of the Q.S.F. finally put everyone out of their misery by turning the clock back two years. He personally elected a Steering Committee that operated two years ago. In their operating period they accomplished nothing and to be honest about the whole idea, no one in their right mind can see them accomplishing too much this time either.

Cynical? maybe, honest? yes. The men required to make a steering committee like this are not on the committee. To know what is required for the cure of soccer, men of knowledge, experience and know-how have to be co-opted so that all ideas can be applied to all levels of the code. Of the men elected there are at least four who between them could not amass sixteen years of experience in the game at one level never mind at all levels.

Just in case the reading of this paragraph appears to be an attack on individuals, it is not, it is simply aimed at the fact that the majority of the men elected

could not even begin to understand the problems besetting the code at all levels so no matter how well intentioned they are they must struggle from the word "go" and when the petty jealousies and self esteem that appear to exist in every club surfaces in voting power, no progress is practically guaranteed.

In analysing the committee it must be told that nominations were not called. The President selected the majority, one of his selections not even being present, one nomination was received from the floor, and one member asked to be elected. During all this one club stood up and complained there were too many first division representatives on the panel.

You will note that there appears to be no thought as to the "quality" of committee members based on the person's experience in the game, the level of his experience, the criteria appears to be what level of soccer is represented. Once again the thinking of the super cynical.

One of the elected members saw fit not to contribute one word to the whole proceedings yet Terry Brown who spoke so deeply, and well, wasn't considered.

That sums up the meeting that was to lay out soccer's destiny. It is to be hoped that the men of the Steering Committee will overcome their own lack of experience and be inspired and motivated to come up with some course of action that will benefit all. They have a thankless task and not too much time to accomplish this almost impossible job. For the good of soccer they have to succeed.

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## THE SEMI-FINALS

ONCE again the QSF saw fit to try Saturday night as a soccer attraction and a goodly crowd of around 1,000 turned up to see the top four do battle. All camps excepting St. George appeared to have their little group of faithful supporters but once again the marginal, or neutral, spectator was conspicuous by his or her absence.

However the vocal groups gave the place an atmosphere it has lacked for weeks and Redlands and Annerley provided the entertainment first up for the right to make progress to the Preliminary Final.

The early game proved to be a bit of a flop, not so much due to lack of effort, it was just too one sided with the threat of Millman and Kelso's speed and aggression and the ball skills of ex Annerley's favourite John Deegan always playing havoc with Annerley's defensive set up. Annerley are a quandary of a side.

They are not over endowed with players of "star" quality and yet they have reached third place in the League. This performance says a lot for the tactical ability of coach Kenny Bass for without players like Rooney and Ferguson they would be a very ordinary side.

However, with Redlands pushing forward all the time the crowd were guaranteed excitement plus and that they were given with generous helpings from Kelso who, if taken in hand, could be a threat in any company. Ronnie Millman is one of the tragedies of the Brisbane system, he is fast, dangerous, a good mover on and off the ball, has his priorities all in the correct places and yet the number of times he "misses out" in a game because of a lack in the basic skill of ball control is tragedy indeed.

Deegan, Morris and Catchpole who all seem to have been around for ever played their parts admirably and the only time Dick Karreman, another veteran, was in trouble was when Gary Lovell boomed in a thirty yard free kick and was Dick in trouble, he never saw the ball. Other highlights, a tremendous hook shot from young Chris Hill with an absolutely stupendous save from Ferguson. Forgettable moments. The defensive marking when Hill scored with his header, and the attempt to clear off the line when another bounce ball sneaked into the net. Annerley will want to forget it, Redlands might just be finding form at the right time. Some of their football was bordering on the classy with quite a few moves being built up from the back instead of the usual booming long balls. St. George had

better not treat them lightly on this form.

The second game was in the true semi final tradition. St. George and Eagles lined up at full strength and Eagles even went as far as trying a bit of promotion work with some junior kids leading the players between a team of pretty young cheer leaders.

At the other end of the field? ho hum just another game to St. George, why worry about making it a big occasion. The game itself rocketed from the word go and was a credit to the conditioners of both teams. Both goalkeepers were kept busy and that's the sort of thing the fans want to see, action in the penalty box.

However it was amazing to see people leaving the ground even as early as the first half, we must assume they were diehard Annerley or Redland supporters they certainly didn't enjoy a game of soccer for the two teams were really dishing up the goods out on the field.

All around the field individual battles were taking place, Mylonas and Cochrane were having a rare old contest, in mid field Docherty, Fagan and Knott were perhaps just shading McCabe, Marszalek and Eagles new Irish import. The first half belonged to St. George who in the main dominated things taking the lead and then unluckily losing it to a rather tame penalty. However at half time Matt Carson changed Marszalek and the other Irish boy and right away Eagles began to fire.

The game now became a real ding dong affair and if any criticism has to be given it must be that everyone was trying to do everything just a little bit too quickly. Of course that's what cup ties are all about and after the extra time period was all over Eagles stood as winners.

The difference between the sides was perhaps that in losing a man early Eagles drew upon extra reserves of strength and will-power. St. George on the other hand never capitalised on the extra man, both full backs refused to commit themselves to the overlap and this meant Eagles could perform quite adequately with two front runners, Brennan's speed and mobility equating the loss of McCabe.

Marley and McCabe are both far too long in the tooth to be sent off for their retaliation act. Mind you John Woods could have lined them up and given it to them good and proper for their retaliatory kicks didn't cause any serious injury.

Congratulations to both teams, a highly entertaining game, hope the next one is as good.

## TOOWOOMBA SIDELINES

Toowoomba's season, as far as premiership fixtures and grand finals for all our clubs are concerned, is over, including also a determined 'fight' by Wanderers and Rockville to reverse an executive decision over a game between Rockville and Willowburn which resulted in Wanderers losing their chance of their first premiership win in some years.

Coincidentally, Rockville were guilty of much the same offence as a club that played our own St. Albans in the Q.S.F. 3rd division, namely, the playing of a suspended player. Wanderers, through Rockville appealed against the executive decision which brought the matter before the Council of the Toowoomba and District Soccer Federation at their September meeting. The Council upheld the Executive Committee's decision and, finally, Willowburn were safe in the knowledge that they were, after all, Toowoomba's 1977 1st division Premiers.

After the storm Willowburn and Wanderers share Toowoomba's 1st division honours with Wanderers qualifying as Grand Final Champions after hammering Willowburn in a full of action Grand Final by 4-1. A great game and a fitting end to a good season for Wanderers.

For those readers who are interested in the outcome of the Toowoomba season our final results read: 1st Division Premiers — Willowburn; 1st Division Grand Final Champions — Wanderers; 2nd Division Premiers and Grand Final Champions — Toowoomba United; 3rd Division Premiers — Rockville Rovers; 3rd Division Grand Final Champions — St. Albans; and Consolation Cup winners — Dalby (1st Division).

As you can see the honours are pretty well shared among most of our clubs with Rangers, Lockyer United and Kingaroy the only clubs to miss. Well, not entirely. They will be presented with the wooden spoon awards for their individual divisions.

Following the end of the premierships and grand finals we have entered a month where Soccer has gone mad. In qualification of that statement I refer to the fact that more mid week soccer is being scheduled now than at any time in the season, as well as representative games over weekends.

Traditionally we have our annual Country versus City rounds which, already, have been played. In the first round, played at Dalby, Country held City to a draw in the senior game and put one over the City Under-21 side by winning 4-3. Come the second round City made sure of not losing again — or drawing — by beating Country 3-0 in the senior game and also in the Under-21 game by 3-2.

In between these games our juniors represented Toowoomba in games against Bankstown teams, under floodlights at the Bridge Street Oval, followed by ladies' games played by four ladies teams from Toowoomba and then a Toowoomba Colts game against St. Helens' Colts. A very varied programme highlighted by an exiting Colts game, played at a very fast pace and won, at the finals whistle by Toowoomba's Colts with a score of 5-4.

Another mid week programme of soccer is planned for this week by the Willowburn Club which will feature Willowburn's Q.S.F. 3rd Division side playing Toowoomba's Colts and 2nd Division premiers Toowoomba United pitting their skills against our 1st Division premiers, Willowburn — all under floodlights. Also over both recent weekends the Toowoomba Junior Soccer Association has been busy with the Allgas knockout tournament for juniors. A memorable tourna-

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
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ment which always seems to bring out the best in our junior players and this year was no exception. Unfortunately for our juniors the event didn't produce the 'gate' it did last year — probably due to the strong, cold winds blowing but for those who did attend, the juniors showed Allgas their sponsorship was not wasted.

Allgas have also entered the senior field with sponsorship and, last week, presented Toowoomba's Colts with a brand new playing uniform bearing, of course, the Allgas name on shirts and socks. A big step forward for us because Toowoomba is not noted for its sponsorship of soccer—despite the hundreds who now play the game in this area of Queensland.

Still to come in our 1977 season are the Craven 'A' Shield games between Toowoomba's top 1st Division Clubs, Willowburn and Wanderers and Stanthorpe's top Clubs, Ballendine and Carlton. This competition will see each team from Toowoomba playing each team from Stanthorpe. The team with the most points, or the most goals for, to goals against, will win the shield.

The first round will be played at Bridge Street Oval on Sunday, 18th September, in Toowoomba and the second round at Stanthorpe on the 25th September. Planned also is a Toowoomba representative game against North Star seniors, colts and juniors on the 25th and against Logan Athletic on the 2nd October, whilst on the 25th the Darling Downs Institute of Advanced Education's Amateur Soccer Club will be staging their own 6-a-side tournament and on the 1st October Toowoomba meet Stanthorpe in the final round of their two round Inter-City clash.

As stated earlier, a month in which soccer has gone mad — and pleased I am to be able to boast of it. A halt has to be made sometime, of course, and I don't think that is too far away even though there is plenty of talk about of trying to run a summer competition, in the evenings. With Christmas barely three months off I'll believe that when I see it.

During the off season our newly formed branch of the Queensland Soccer Coaches Federation will be kept busy satisfying requests for Soccer coaching courses, particularly in the country areas. A successful course was run last week for Dalby's juniors and Toowoomba's chief coach and branch president, Dave Ferguson and Stan Mills have been requested to return prior to the start of next season for a further spell of local

assistance. This weekend they are off to Roma and then, later on, Charleville. Next year, early on, the plan is to run a series of courses in Toowoomba for senior and junior coaches in an effort to update their coaching methods.

## BRISBANE CITY v FOOTSCRAY

THOSE of us who are addicted to TV soccer whether it be British or our own Philips League brand knew that last Sunday was a test day for Brisbane soccer.

During the week we had seen Footscray and Adelaide City playing a classic game of football with only Dixie Dean's opportunism deciding the issue in Adelaide's favour. Footscray, a team of football purists who many say lack the necessary "dig" up front came to Brisbane and all discerning eyes knew that only one of City's better displays stood between them and a hiding.

It wasn't to be and though the score shows 3-1 in Footscray's favour there the "closeness" ends, for if ever a team were outclassed, out-thought and out-paced in every facet of the game it was at Perry Park last Sunday. Footscray were superb, a tribute to their club, their coach and themselves. The manner in which they clinically executed City bodes well for their future in Philips League and sounded out a warning for City that better be heeded, or else.

The difference in the two teams was considerable. Footscray had eleven tradesmen pushing the ball around from man to man with such assurance that it reminded the spectator of some of the games played by overseas sides against our local Queensland battlers. They moved all over the field in little triangles constantly aiding and abetting each other very seldom, if ever, being caught in possession and if so certainly not in the danger area.

Their "slack" moments could be counted on one hand, twice in the first half when Larry Gaffney found himself completely unmarked, dead centre in front of goal and played the ball right into goalkeeper Boland's arms. In the second half, when leading 2-0 they eased off and began to hold the ball and it was then City scored. This lone counter acted like a sting and very quickly the two goal lead was restored by some beautiful football and it

was now the Perry Park crowd began to show spontaneous applause for mid field play of the highest calibre, the first time it's been heard for years.

Thank you Footscray, soccer is a simple game when played well, only the players add the degree of difficulty. No one starred in the Melbourne team, they were all top class team men.

What about City? Everything has gone. From the most exciting Brisbane team for years they have deteriorated into a group of individuals. "Kesson's marauders" have become "Saftich's loners" they don't look like a team, don't play like a team and what is worse they are deteriorating to such an extent that they are no longer attractive in defeat.

Echeverria, who was probably the most gifted mid fielder to come to Brisbane ever is being absolutely wasted as a sweeper. Any player who has an above average ability can perform as a free back but a good sweeper must have the ability to organise a defence. This Roberto does not have but he has the ability to create the unexpected and therefore must be played in mid field. Hermiston on the other hand has all the attributes and experience of a top class defender and also the talent to bring out the best in other lesser players around him.

Pimblett is a great playmaker and as such should never be out of a team, Gaffney is the perfect foil for these two, buzzing and backing up the attack when called upon.

These three made up one of the finest mid fields in the country sixteen weeks ago, but a man with two cork eyes could tell you that since then the boys have changed. The blunt truth is they don't appear fit and it is a pity for these three could have taken on any mid field trio in the country.

Remember what they did to Rooney, Richards and Byrne when Kesson threw them in at the deep end first game of the

### EDITOR'S REPLY

As the Soccer writer for The Courier-Mail, I take exception to many of the comments made in Derek Mann's letter.

He claims there is a strong feeling that the press in Brisbane is biased towards certain clubs. I for one do not have any special leanings towards a particular Club or Clubs, but felt it only fair to write stories on occasions about Southside Eagles and Wynnum, the only two First Division Clubs which regularly contacted me personally with team information.

From memory, Derek Mann has contacted me only once this season, and that was very recently when he replied to comments made in The Telegraph by Matt Carson. The Courier-Mail subsequently published a story as a result of that conversation.

In regard to newspaper reports being so inaccurate they are hardly worth reading, I feel it again is only fair he state the incidents of inaccuracy and to name the newspaper and writer concerned when making a general criticism of the press.

For example, when the many concerned with Soccer have criticised the First Division standard this year, they don't specifically mean St. George, or any other Club, is the main offender. The "you send us your reports" system may not be satisfactory or "sophisticated" but is unavoidable when 12 First Division teams are involved, and that situation applies to coverage of Aussie Rules and Rugby Union in Brisbane.

Having been a Soccer writer since 1965, the last eight years on a fulltime basis, I feel I am well versed in the various personalities who comprise the First Division competition, without having to visit Clubs at training.

It's worth remembering, thanks to the Philips League, we have managed to promote some personalities this year, who have become recognisable names to those outside the Soccer sphere. I refer to the Hermistons, Bennetts, Fagans, Spearritts, Gaffneys, etc. even though the usual

## CALL FOR CURRAN

SYDNEY — Col. Curran, the socceroo's most wanted man for the demanding World Cup matches ahead, will be available for the remaining Asia/Oceania elimination matches.

A release request by National coach Jimmy Shoulder to Curran's employers, Gretley Colliery, a division of Peko Wallsend Mining Group, has been approved.

Curran is delighted with the prospect of again playing for the National team.

"I will be available for selection in both away trips in late October and November," the forceful fullback said.

"It is up to Jimmy Shoulder when he needs me, with the Australia-Kuwait game coming up on October 16 as well."

Curran's return to the National scene became a must when trainee physical education teacher, Harry Williams, became unavailable for the away trip to Hong Kong and Seoul next month due to examinations.

However Williams has been cleared for matches in Kuwait City and Tehran on Saturday 19 and Friday 25 November.

Informed opinion feel that nowhere on the Australian horizon is there another left back with the prowess of either Curran or Williams.

Curran also possesses the ability to completely handle the right back position as demonstrated for Western Suburbs this season in the Philips League.

This should mean that both he and Williams could appear in defence on the second trip.

In addition, Curran can play as a forceful defensive mid fielder with a testing shot.

Certainly his availability has increased Australia's chance of being in the finals in Argentina next June, although Iran are ahead by one point from an equal three games at this stage.

Jim Shoulder returned to Sydney from Perth on Tuesday after assessing under 23 International, Fauro Iozelli for a defensive place.

Already in his squad is Adrian Alston,

Shoulder is not believed to be satisfied that outstanding defender Doug Utjesenovic could handle the World Cup stresses following a long recovery period from his knee operation.

Shoulder has few illusions about the after effects of surgery, after a knee problem ruled him out from a continued full time career in English professional soccer.

## BIG MONEY MEN

LONDON, Those who have questioned the wisdom of spending 440,000 sterling (695,200 AUST. DOLLARS) on a football player need only look at the rise of Kenny Dalglish, now of Liverpool, and the decline of his old club Celtic for an answer.

Dalglish who signed for that huge sum at the start of the English soccer season to replace Kevin Keegan in the Liverpool attack, looks set to repay every penny Europe's top club paid for him.

He scored Liverpool's only goal — a brilliant dipping shot over seven opponents — in the tough 1-1 draw away to Ipswich on Saturday to take his tally to six in seven matches and keep the champions locked together with Manchester City at top on the first division table.

In contrast Celtic of Glasgow, the team Dalglish led to the Scottish League and Cup double last season, have been in the doldrums since his departure. They have taken only one point from five League matches and after their defeat against leaders Aberdeen, they are placed second from bottom on the Premier Division Table.

Manager Jock Stein will no doubt want to spend some of the Dalglish fortune to find new talent.

Manchester City, the English League Leaders on goal difference, have also been

big spenders — Mick Channon cost them 330,000 sterling (521,400 AUST.) from Southampton — and they consolidated their title bid with a 1-1 draw away to Queens Park Rangers.

Considering that City have never won at Loftus Road in the First Division, the result was a good one for them. But much of the attention was focused on Rangers' midfielder Gerry Francis, whose career has been hampered by injuries for the past 15 months.

Playing before England's caretaker Manager Ron Greenwood, Francis was constantly impressive and scored the 35th-minute equaliser from ten yards. The former England skipper must have convinced Greenwood that he is ready for an International Recall.

Nottingham Forest, who joined the spending spree in midweek by forking out 270,000 sterling (426,000 AUST.) for former England Goalkeeper Peter Shilton, remain among the early pace-makers on their return to the First Division.

Forest jumped to third place on the table with a comfortable 2-0 home win against Aston Villa, although Shilton was hardly tested on his debut by an out-of-touch Villa, sadly missing Scottish International Andy Gray.

Sir Alf Ramsay, the man who guided England to the World Cup in 1966, saw

Birmingham win their second successive match under his temporary management as they overcame a struggling Newcastle 3-0.

Ray Graydon, signed from Aston Villa at the start of the season, scored his first two goals for Coventry in their 2-1 home win against Middlesbrough, while Tom Richie was another two-goal marksman as Bristol City gained a morale-boosting 3-2 win over Westham.

Malcolm MacDonald scored his first League goal of the season for Arsenal, who won 2-1 at home to lowly Leicester, and Chris Garland chalked up his first for 21 months as Chelsea silenced a 54,000 crowd at Old Trafford with a surprise 1-0 win over Manchester United, so impressive against St. Etienne of France the previous week.

Bolton and Tottenham Hotspur, respective 2-0 winners away to Sunderland and Blackpool, make the pace in the Second Division where newly-promoted Crystal Palace still surprise. Palace, continuing the benefit from the goal-scoring exploits of the explosive Rachid Harkouk, are 3rd on the table after beating Sheffield United 2-0 away.

## DOCHERTY WITH DERBY

LONDON, Tommy Docherty, who led Manchester United to triumph in the English Football Association (F.A.) Cup Final in May, became manager of Derby County — only two days after it was reported that he had agreed to join Norwegian Champions Lillestrom as chief coach.

Docherty was sacked by United during the summer following publicity about his relations with the wife of the club's physiotherapist.

Derby, who were English League Champions two years ago, have made a disastrous start this season, and are 21st of the 22 teams in the first division. Their 2-2 draw at home with Leeds was Derby's sixth game of the season without a win.

There has been speculation for some time that their young manager Colin Murphy would be replaced.

Derby's Chairman George Hardy said: "We have offered Tommy Docherty a three-year contract."

Docherty arrived at the ground after last Saturday's match to complete the details, but Murphy may stay with Derby. "Tommy has expressed an interest in keeping him on as his assistant," Hardy

Derby appointed Murphy "caretaker" last December when Dave Mackay left the club, but shortly afterwards Mackay's predecessor Brian Clough was asked to

return. Clough decided to stay with Nottingham Forest whom he guided to promotion from first division two last season.

Docherty said on radio that Lillestrom had agreed to release him from his contract.

"When I phoned them to explain I would rather stay in England they agreed to tear up the contract immediately."


